LT GLYN BATEMAN WHITTAKER (35-42)

The following is taken from the Autumn 1993 OF Magazine :-

M. F. H. DOBSON, SQ. LDR. (34-42) having read the 'Second Sixty Years'. Mike says with great nostalgia – he is wondering if the many people who knew GLYN WHIT-TAKER (1935-42) would like to be reminded of Glyn in these two pictures. Glyn spent some time of his last summer holidays with Mike at Huntingfield and his mother said of him, 'what a presence that boy has, but such a tragic face'. Sadly she was proved right. After the war he met Glyn's parents at Southwold and Glyn's mother gave him the photograph of Glyn in uniform which was believed to have been taken at Wareham, Dorset after his commissioning in the Royal Marines. Whittaker died of wounds in Normandy in 1944.

The squash team of 1942 shows PETER COLEMAN (39–43), Mr THOMAS, DEREK SEAGROVE (39–44), MIKE DOBSON (1934–42), GLYN WHIT-TAKER (35–42), and MIKE GARRARD (36 42). They only played three matches



owing to travel restrictions and lack of opposition. Glyn was a far superior player to any of the others and he regularly won the Senior Squash Competition. In his last term, Glyn voluntarily scratched and allowed Mike to win! He still has the cup, and memories of the nature of 'that brave and valued friend.'
