Brian Rosen (S40-46) sent message to say that 2004 had been a busy but important year, particularly with it being the 60th anniversary of so many wartime events with many ceremonies commemorating battles, air crashes or liberation of towns etc. With the deaths of both our President and Secretary in 2004, I have unexpectedly become Chairman of the Royal British Legion Lyons Branch – a job I am proud to do but has meant much cutting back on other activities. In France there is immense appreciation of the part played by the Allies during the war. I was very privileged to carry the Union Flag at several ceremonies; and at its appearance, we were treated with a great deal of respect and gratitude for those



who had fought and many who died for the liberation of this country. Perhaps the most moving ceremony was the family reunion in a small Alpine village cemetery where the bodies of Air Chief Marshal Sir Trafford Leigh Mallory, his wife and the crew of the York aircraft, which crashed on the journey to Ceylon, are buried. Among the relatives I met was John Mallory, 84-year-old nephew of Leigh and son of George, the great British climber who died on Everest in 1924.

The attached photo on May 7th 2005 near the summit of a mountain near Annecy where we had just witnessed a parachute drop from a Dakota of 16 ex-soldiers using authentic parachutes and kit used during the war. (Except that they had reserve parachutes that we didn't in the early 50's.) The photo was taken after a ceremony attended by many VIP's including the British and American Consul Generals. I was carrying our flag which was much more strenuous than dropping out of a Dakota - which I hadn't done for about 50 years!

Unfortunately, I don't have a photo of the OFs that attended my 75th birthday in September 2004 in Suffolk. These included my two brothers Michael (S40-46) and Anthony (S40-48), sons Simon (S64-75) and Timothy (S66-76) and daughter Sarah (BH 88-93), cousin George Payne (S43-50) and contemporaries Michael Dobson (R 34-42) and Gerald Carter (K 41-44) plus honorary members Shirley Williams and Bob Williams. A good party!

What an excellent book **John Waddell** has produced describing the wartime years at the College. It brought back many memories and it seems incredible now to realise that we did manage to carry on relatively normal lives and that our major battles were the inter house rugby matches. Few of us did not lose members of our own family and the losses of Old Boys, particularly those we knew well were impossible for us to assimilate. Perhaps the remarks by **Chris Seddon** waiting to see his Dad towards the end of the war'I was about eight and a half and had not seen him for four years so I was afraid that I would not recognise him'..... were those I found most moving.

GREECE

Ivor Webb (K37-42) and Richard Rowe (S65-74) met in January 2005 at a beach-front restaurant just outside Thessaloniki, Greece, for what might have been the first SOF Greece Dinner. Ivor is originally from the Framlingham area and is brother to Mrs Barbara Hall, the former post-mistress at the Framlingham Post Office and mother of Martin Hall (K67-75). Richard was in Greece on business between traveling to Macedonia and Istanbul.

Ivor was at Fram during the time of the evacuation to Repton; but being a day-boy, he stayed behind in Fram and effectively lost a year of schooling. Reminiscences about Fram included **Alfred Molson**



(K38-43), Andrew Currie (R38-43) and the Bloomfield family. Ivor remembers Sydney Bloomfield (G41-45) who used to live Cretingham Lodge. Having been in the Police Force, Ivor was interested to know that Stephen Bloomfield (K71-78) is now Borough Commander of Haringey Police in London. Ivor also had good memories of Sgt Twite at Framlingham Town Police Station. Sgt Twite died about 35 years ago and was father to David Twite (R50-57) and grandfather to Mark Twite (R79-87) and Andy Twite (R84-92). Ivor was proudly wearing his Interpol badge on his blazer at the dinner.

SOUTH AFRICA

Tim Lewis (K53-59) sent in a message of congratulations for the new Yearbook.

I was at Brandeston first and then the College over the period 1952 to 1958. Although my name was Thomas Lewis I was known as Tim as my father had the same name.

My father took the golden handshake from the army in 1957. Soon after, we left for Southern Rhodesia on The Edinburgh Castle; and drove from Beira to Salisbury in a series of 2 short wheel Landrovers. Here we were sent to a Tobacco farm where we stayed for 18 months. The family then journeyed to The Mkushi Block in Northern Rhodesia where we were allocated a 1700-acre farm. It had 10 acres cleared and a borehole with road access. We built a pole and dagga house with an antheap floor. We made clay bricks and burnt them in our own kiln; and we built Tobacco Barns and handling facilities.

I bought myself an old greener shotgun and went hunting as there were no shops at all to buy food. To go shopping meant a journey down the great north road to Broken Hill - some 320 kms of dirt road. In those days you could find 300 Hartebeast in one herd. They are all gone now. From my Greener, I progressed to a hunting rifle and became a friend of the local hunting fraternity.

My father decided I needed further education (not my strong forte) so he sent to Gwebi Agricultural College. This I enjoyed and left with a Diploma. After that, I volunteered for national service; this I also really enjoyed. After this I became farmer in Southern Rhodesia.

Having kept my contacts with the hunting fraternity, I regularly joined them on crocodile poaching trips. These old men taught me all the tricks of survival and illegal movement in Central Africa; borders were no barrier.

When Ian Smith declared , my father contacted me and told me to get out - but I decided to stay. Eventually the trouble started and I joined, as a volunteer, The Combat Tracker Group. From this it was only a matter of time before I went for selection for The Selous Scouts where I stayed until 1980.

After this I worked in many countries in Africa as an Agricultural Consultant, working for such personalities as Tiny Rowlands - Great man and great fun.

I am resident in Kwazulu Natal South Africa in a country town called Empangeni. We are close to the game reserves of Umfolozi and Mkhuze. I run a secuirty company here called Control Risks Group with 240 employees. Should any of our OF's or other school members be in this area it would be my pleasure to sort out accommodation and possibly transport.

I have been told that I may have to retire "soon" – but I find this idea difficult. I recently did some work for The Crown Agents in Mozambique on cross border smuggling - all the old routes are still open and flourishing. Again good fun.

I have kept this short as obviously some things must remain unsaid.
