AUSTRALIA

Mark Birrell (G78-83) – as you will read below, Phil Bower has been in touch with Sydney OFs about an SOF Supper when I visit the city in August 2011 with my family. Mark has been in touch to say "Sounds like a lot of fun. Should be available so count me in. Will see if my brother is interested but have a feeling he Is going to the UK for a trip."

Phil Bower (G65-74) has been in regular touch to update on his music, photographic and roadie activities. He was first in touch before Christmas 2020 giving an update on the shows he had been involved in "recently done Muse, Linkin Park, the annual Wiggles shows and from 27/12 I'll be flat out for the next 14 days on the best New Year's Eve show in the world. 

Anyway my eye did not come good for about 10 weeks, but my Specialist has now given me the OK to drive again from 13th December. Ruth, my wife, is glad that her chauffering duties have finished.

I am taking our daughter Sarah & her girls Ellen 18, who has just finished school & her sister Lauren nearly 16 on a cruise in the South Pacific on the 21st of April 2011. This will probally be the last time we shall all be together, as Ellen is hopefully off to University early in the New Year.

We are taking a further & longer cruise on 1st of July in the S.Pacific-28 nights, calling at Norfolk Island, Nuku'alofa, Rarotonga, Papeete, Bora Bora, Apia, Savusavu, Noumea, so should be relaxing. Not to sure if

we shall visit the UK again, your economy is in dire straits, costs rising substantially, and your weather not the best, so we shall see, but certainly not before 2012, and then insurance for travellers over 80 is very expensive."

I was next in touch with John about our trip to Australia. As well as giving lots of helpful travel advice, he also volunteered to organise an OF Lunch at **Peter Bailey (K34-38)** Twin Waters Golf Club on Monday 8 August 2011. As well as my family and John and Ruth, we are also expecting Peter and Joy Bailey, Henrietta & Peter Simpson, and Alison & **Neville Marsh (S53-61)**, plus possibly **Robert Goodale (K58-66)**.

Of course Queensland was badly hit by flooding in March 2011 and John gave the following update "We are all OK. The flooding mainly is from Cairns down to Bunderberg and all parts to the West such as Emerald., Dalby, Condomine. It will be weeks before the clearing up is finished as it is not only the water level that has to recede, its the resulting damage to property, roads and infrastructure and housing etc. This of course has happened before, but this time is the worst ever and the clean up bill will be in the BILLIONS. We have had all ot of rain and all the dams are full, however this does not stop our water bills from rising - just Govt incompetence. But we must not complain as we live in a marvellous part of the world, mainly warm, with NO Snow!!."

In a further update following the flooding he said "I have heard from Neville Marsh, they are ok as they live on high ground, but they are cut off from surrounding areas due to the floods. They have ample provisions so will be OK. The floods up north ie from Cairns down have broken up the Main Road (M1) in many places, which will take sometime to repair. In view of this I think you should be very cautious and plan to take 4 nights down to Brisbane. Although the M1 (Cairns-Brisbane) is a major road, it is certainly not a highway, not many parts are double lane, and overtaking is not good to say the least. So err on the side of caution, is my advice."

Rob Di Goodale (K58-66) was put in touch with me by **Jerry Lee (K59-64)** – see under Malta. He is visiting Malta with his wife from 6 April until about 18 April 2011, when they will catch the ferry to Sicily, spend a few days in Sicily and then fly out of Sicily on 22nd April to Marseille where they pick up a car and do a house swap with people in a village near Toulon. They will then spend a month touring Provence, then the Languedoc region and also down to Barcelona. They were also considering going the other way (east) visiting the Cannes Film Festival and the Cinque Terra region in Italy. Then sometime in mid June they will fly to England, visiting their son in Manchester, and around 20 June 2011 will spend 4-5 days traveling with a friend to The Somme and Flanders for visits to WW1 war graves and battle fields celebrating the exploits

of our ancestors. Finally on 28 June they will return to the Land Of Oz. There is a possibility that he may be able to join us at the SOF Lunch just north of Brisbane, but he teaches music at a local private high school and may not be able to get away.

He also sent me this photo of himself and his eldest son Sam.

As he had mentioned going to northern France to see battle fields of WW1, I asked him if he was going anywhere near Amiens where OF, **Captain Gordon Flowerdew (1894-99)** was awarded his VC at Moreuil Wood and he is buried south west of Amiens at Namps-au-Val



British Cemetery. He wasn't sure at the time of writing, but would bear it in mind. He said he had been at the College with **Nicholas Flowerdew (K57-65)**. Sadly I had to tell him that he had died, possibly as long ago as 1992. Gordon Flowerdew VC was his great uncle.

Peter Hughes (G52-56) who will be attending the Cairns OF Supper being organised by Chris Shaw (see below) was in touch at the time of the flooding in Queensland and this is his account "The major flooding in terms of inundation, evacuation, loss of property, power and life is in the river basins of the Fitzroy (Qld) and Burnett rivers. Biggest affected are the major cities of Rockhampton and Mackay with smaller inland towns such as Emerald also under water. Economically, this is a big blow to primary agricultural industries which were just coming good after an 11 year drought. In Cairns region there has been localised flooding and limited damage, Chris and Rebecca are in a lower lying area a little north of the CBD and close to the Barron River which usually flows rapidly from the higher plateau of the Atherton Tablelands at such times. Those that can stay home, read and write books, watch the cricket and generally keep out of the way! Final Test starts in Sydney in about 5 minutes, showers are forecast so Australia may yet survive a drubbing at the hands of the revitalised England team. Best wishes for 2011 and the planning of your Antipodean Trip."

Nick Kennon (Z79-85) another Queenslander was also good enough to provide some feedback at the time of the flooding "No major floods here on the Gold Coast, just a lot of bad weather – very grey, very wet and very windy! The odd road has been closed as they had parts under water. But this is nothing in comparison to what they are experiencing further north." Nick is head of Special Education Services at Arundel State School.

Kenneth Mackenzie (K45-53) was in touch after we posted a news item on the website about **Patrick Spraggs (G04-09)** golfing achievements – see

My mind goes back to the war years when both these trophies perched on our dining room cupboard having been won by my Father, a member of Woodbridge G.C. immediately pre-war after which, for a number of years, there was no competition. At that time, I believe he was the only amateur to hold both cups but after the war an American, serving at Bentwaters also achieved the feat. Congratulations to him!" Ken lives in Mosman Park, Perth along with a number of other OFs. We need someone to organise a Perth OF Supper!

Neville Marsh (S53-61) lives outside Brisbane and gave this perspective on the Queensland flooding "We are OK, thanks. Rockhampton, about a 1000kms north of here, has had it bad and also out in the west, St George as well. It looks as if the floods have peaked at 10-15 metres above usual levels. In Brisbane we have had the edge of the tropical rain (an expression which means heavy steady rain - 5 inches in the week after Christmas).

A bit of news for the Mag. I spoke to **Ken Mayhew** on the phone who had come out for the Gabba and Adelaide tests. I couldn't believe his dates at school - 1929-34! It turns out that he is 93. I was at Fram with his son. Anyway, what an amazing achievement at his age. He saw two good tests. Unfortunately, we couldn't meet up. I hoped we could have breakfast together but he left his hotel at 8.00am to get to the Gabba! **Marcus Marshall (G76-79)** also tried to make contact. Peter Bailey is well and spent Christmas Day with John Gates and respective wives at John Gate's place at Maroochydore. "

He was amused to see his photo in last year's Newsletter. "The actual story is that I asked Norman to take a photo of me by the door at Brandeston as I have (somewhere) a photo of me by the same door in 1954. If I can find it, I will send it in so the two can be published side by side! "[No joy yet in finding 1954 photo]

I look forward to seeing Neville and his wife at the OF Lunch just north of Brisbane.

Marcus Marshall (G76-79) got in touch with the website team to provide updated details. At the time of writing it doesn't seem possible that Marcus will be able to attend the OF Lunch just north of Brisbane, but hopefully he will provide an update when time permits.

John Masson (M74-79) was also in touch about the Queensland floods saying "Floods are all south of Cairns and Townsville at Rockhampton, Bundaberg and inland to Chinchilla, Emerald etc."

Simon Narroway (G72-75) was my best man over 31 years ago but has lived away from the UK most of that time and has spent over 25 years in Sydney. During our trip we will be meeting up with him and his family. He has provided the following update "After 25 years in banking, I switched to Management Consulting a few years ago. I look after business development for the region so I travel a fair bit. For example, I am in Melbourne or Brisbane most weeks for a day or two. I enjoy it – it keeps me active and engaged. We may decide to change direction when our youngest finishes school in 3 years. Yoko went back to work a few years ago as the children became more 'responsible'. She now works in mental health care for the NSW State Gov't. We have six children – Lisa (26), George (24), Harry (21), Richard (20), Sarah (18), and Sayuri (15). Apart from Richard the rest are currently living with us. "

Simon is also going to be at the Sydney OF Supper Phil Bower is organising.

Tom O'Donald (S51-57) wished everyone "a very Happy and Holy Christmas and may next year bring everything all that you wish for." Following publication of the Yearbook Tom wrote "Once again, my

congratulations on your latest magazine contribution. Because of my circumstances, I have very little news; after all what can happen in a nursing home other than people dropping off the perch and new people taking their place. That said, every time I get crook, I am quite certain that I headed for the crematorium only to find that once again I have lost the job. One highlights of late was the visit of Chris and Rebecca Shaw(K50-56) who I managed to con into paying a visit to Adelaide during their trip around Australia, having convinced them that any visit to the south of Australia would not be complete without a visit to the pearl of the south (Hell some people are easily conned). Their's was a pretty mammoth journey so I don't really feel guilty in



persuading them that no journey would be complete without a visit to Adelaide, and in particular to my Nursing Home."

He went on to say "I have been trying without success to find the old data base that was on the OF's web page. It's all go in the world of retirement!"

Around Christmas time he wrote "Thanks Chris E. for your Christmas message. We too, wish all OF's a merry Christmas, and a healthy and successful new year. This year I've managed to catch up with Peter and Janet Hughes, also of Cairns, Louis (Brandeston) and Fiona Simon from Malanda, Mike Garnett from Romsey, north of Melbourne and Tom and Veronica O'Donald of Adelaide. Normally, at this time of the year, one would expect hot and dry weather throughout our island continent, (ideal for Cricket) but this year has brought record rains and flooding in the southern states. Here, in Queensland, we have very sultry and oppressive weather with little or no breeze. Christmas, New Year and some cyclones are just around the corner, and we are watching Europe cope with Ice Age conditions. One day, hopefully, some bright spark will be able to transfer some of our heat to ameliorate some of your cold. In the meantime, a glass of something cold, woody and white for us, and hot toddies all round in Europe and Britain!"

In addition, Chris has organised an OF Tropical Supper on Tuesday 2nd August at the Yorkey's Knob Boating Club. Present will be Chris & Rebecca, **Peter & Janet Hughes (G52-56), Louis & Fiona Simon (BH72-74)** plus my family of 6.

Robert Wallace (K50-58) – following the issue of my pre Christmas message to all overseas OFs, I sadly received the following from Robert's wife Jill "Just a note to let you know that my husband, Robert Wallace (1950-58) passed away on 13 September 2010. He was en-route to Cambridge from Australia to visit me on 30 April when he collapsed at Los Angeles airport. He was diagnosed with a brain tumour but the hospital in LA demanded that he return to Australia as he had private insurance there. He was operated on in Hobart, Tasmania in early May. That appeared to be successful and he had radiotherapy but thirteen weeks later he went rapidly downhill and passed away, just fourteen weeks after diagnosis.

Sadly, he had only retired as a ship's captain in October 2009. However, he had had a great life travelling around the world and we were able to maintain a home in both the UK and Australia, which enabled me to work there for the past nine years. I've attached Bob's eulogy in case you wish to use extracts from it. He was at Brandeston for two years from 1950 and then went on to Framlingham, leaving there when he was 18 to join Port Line as a cadet officer. I think he was also a prefect at Fram. The Tim Goodchild mentioned in the eulogy was also at Framlingham.

Bob tried to attend the annual reunion at Newmarket whenever his leave coincided with the renuion. Would you mind letting the organiser of the Newmarket 'Chapter' know as well, please." Aubrey Whitear (G58-65) also responded to my Christmas message writing as follows "You have shamed me into putting my fingers to the key board! In fact I had intended to write soon after reading Norman Porter's splendid history of Brandeston Hall but time got away from me as it does when you have plenty of it. Other than that I have no excuse.

The history took me back to happy days now, astonishingly, more than fifty years ago. Amongst other things, it reminded me of the simple pleasures like swimming in the Deben (watch out for the pike!), building dams and being introduced by The Hon Sir Mark Hedley LLD (aged 12) to the smoking of oak leaves rolled up in old newspaper! I also remember pleasant Sunday country walks led surprisingly by the intimidating Mr Ferris who also had the capacity to dispense "three bad marks" in my direction for the most inconsequential offence. How nice to discover now that he had a Christian name, John! I note John comes in for a bit of stick from several contributors to the book who consider he was unsuited to the task of teaching prep school boys. Fifty years ago I would have agreed, but looking back I am inclined to the view that just maybe it was his war time experiences that had given him a short fuse. He expected high standards and did not suffer fools gladly. I think we were all better for that. Brandeston was a happy time for me and above all else I credit it with giving me self-reliance and my love of the countryside.

Life continues to be most agreeable in Melbourne and as I write this I am anticipating a great victory today in Perth and awaiting the Boxing Day Test Match with keen anticipation. In the words of Corporal Jones, it is clear the home country batsmen don't like it up them!"

The following is a very edited version of his annual Christmas letter, which amusingly starts off as follows: "I regret I must start this letter on a sad note. I suppose it was inevitable that one day it would come to this, but knowing that it would was of no consolation when it finally happened to me a few months ago and, as you will have gathered by now, I remain upset about it to this day. In fact, I can think of nothing that could have been more calculated to destroy my self-image which up until then was that of a dashing man-about-town. By now you should be beaming all your sympathy in my direction for I am about to reveal all. The fact is I was going about my lawful business travelling into the City by train when with absolutely no provocation whatsoever a spotty youth had the temerity to offer up his seat to me. Of course, at first I pretended not to notice. But he persisted. By now my dander was up and I like to imagine it took three security guards to pull me off him. Fortunately, I was able to extract my revenge later. As I jogged past him while he stood on the

long escalator up from Parliament Station I muttered albeit somewhat sotto voce "A bit of walking too much for you, mate". I might be getting old but I'm still not ready to settle down for the final run to the Judge."

In March they made their almost annual pilgrimage to our less fortunate cousins in the Shaky Isles (NZ). "We like to think of it as missionary work". the Tasman glacier fall into the river below. If you choose the South Island I recommend the West coast: Fox glacier, Franz Joseph, Mt Cook, pancake rocks, Arthur's pass if you want to cross to the East coast but it is fairly well South so can be cold with variable driving conditions. It can be wet during July/August so bring your wellies!"

Roy Farman (K47-55) also provided some excellent advice. "The Bay of Islands is pretty and has a lot of Maori and European (Pakeha) history. A coach trip from Paihia to Cape Reinga (far north) is worthwhile. It takes all day. The Cream Trip (boat trip) from Paihia round the Bay of Islands is good value as are trips to Russell (the old capital) and Waitangi. The train ride from Auckland to Wellington has some spectacular bits over the central plateau. We are 11/2 hours drive from Wellington. We would love to see you if you could call in but it's a little off the track for you. Wellington is a fairly small capital so most things are handy. The Rugby World Cup is on October 2011 so it will be geared up for it."

Katherine Jackson (nee Stringer) (P86-91) was also good enough to provide some excellent travel advice as well as a personal update "We have been in NZ 3 and 1/2 years. I am about to start a new teaching job in a brand new school called Stonefields opening in 2011. He told me all about how he tried setting up holiday camps in Bahamas to target an American audience, but they were not a success. Alfred knew him well as he was living in the Bahamas at the time. He told me to check out the goldfish at Rotorua when we visit.

Late June he was in touch to say his computer had caught fire and he'd lost all his passwords. Communications have now been restored. He was still unsteady on his legs.

Bryan Pearson (\$45-47) has been in regular contact. In November 2010 he was in touch to say that that they had had a great time on their cruise in the Ruby Princess. He said "Venice was great, also Rome, but we skipped going into Naples as it was a cold, dreary, day and the dock area was very dirty, also we read later that there was garbage collector's strike and there was a protest riot going on! Cannes was fun, lots of very expensive yachts, but we wanted to go to Monte Carlo and the trains were on strike so couldn't go, then wanted to go to Grasse by bus but the schedule was too tight. You have to be very careful when doing excursions on your own as, if you are late back, the ship will leave without you, which happened to one party of four who had to find their own way to the next port. Enjoyed Barcelona, very historic and a clean, open city, also Punta Delgarda, then we had 5 sea days, which I much enjoyed, before landing at Ft. Lauderdale. We had a 4 hour layover at Miami and I called Richard Rowe (\$65-74) for a short chat. He was rushing to get ready for a trip himself, but he was due to arrive at the airport just after we left, so we couldn't have an impromptu OF meeting."

They were next booked on a cruise in March 2011 - a 12 day cruise from Papeete back to Honolulu, on the Royal Princess, a much small ship.

A few weeks later I heard the sad news that Bryan's son Michael had died from pancreatic cancer, just 13 days before his 49th birthday.

Early in January 2011 Bryan was in touch again to say that his eagle eye had spotted that we had sent some of the annual dinner notifications out with no date on them! He went on to say "Of course, I couldn't have made the dinner anyway, although I always attended when I was in London. I shall never forget the night that I attended and the announcement was made (do they still do that?) "Mr Bryan Pearson and Lady Marye Rous" - that turned quite a few heads! Marye was a great pal of mine, whom I had originally met at the Ipswich Arts Theatre, she was an amazing character who became quite famous in the middle 50's when she rescued another friend of hers from the French Foreign Legion. We'll be on the Royal Princess, unfortunately not with Nick Carlton (G63-70) this time. All is well here in Hawaii and trust you are surviving the miserable cold weather!"



In early March 2011, the Society was contacted by a Robin Lung, who was looking for information on **Choy Wei-Chung (29-31)**, the first Chinese person and only OF to play tennis at Wimbledon. Then started a series of exchanges involving Bryan. It turned out that Choy's sister was still alive and well and living in Honolulu near Bryan so we put Robin in touch Bryan. They met up and Bryan helped record narration for the fundraising trailer for Robin's documentary on KUKAN – you can see this here http://www.nestedeggproductions.com/finding-kukan/narration-for-fundraising-trailer. You can also see the blog that Robin has written in which he plugs Framlingham(

<u>http://www.nestedeggproductions.com/blog</u>) and has added a link to the Distinguished article on Choy Wei Chung, that makes fascinating reading.

The documentary revolves around a 1941 Oscar-winning film called KUKAN – a documentary that was filmed in China during 1939 and 1940. Robin uncovered a copy of it and is investigating how it was made and what role Li Ling-Ai, a Chinese American author from Hawaii, had in making it. During the course of her investigations she came across Wing Yung (Choy's sister), who was in Chungking just after KUKAN was filmed.

In March 2011 I contacted Bryan to check that all was well in Hawaii after the horrendous tsunami in Japan. He said "We had ample warning, evacuated to high ground about 5.30 am. Tsunami :hit: about 07.30 with a height of 50 cm!! We board the Royal Princess tomorrow."

Finally a big thank you to Bryan for his help and advice on where to stay in Sydney during our trip.

Richard Rowe (S65-74) sent his usual newsy Christmas message and the following is an edited version of his news:-

"2010 has been another hectic year for the Rowe family; but with 3 healthy active boys and 2 busy parents, then there probably isn't any other kind of year. The boys and particularly their ice hockey has been the central focus of activities. We are currently at the local ice rink for some reason for 6 out of 7 days of the week – be it team practices, in-house "Rec" (recreational) games or travelling to another rink for a "Travel" Team game. The ice hockey season, basically runs from September through April with some summer leagues and camps for those who want to keep active / can't break out of the habit of the daily drive to the rink!

In April, we went to Colorado to stay with my brother **Alan (S64-73)** for 8 days. They live near Evergreen, just west of Denver, up at 8000ft. They are close to Echo ski slope and not too far from Breckenridge and some of the other big ski resorts. We toured around on a few days and went for walks in the numerous national / state parks. The scenery in Colorado is spectacular. We would love to going skiing again in 2011 but the boys' Easter break is very late in 2011, so all advice is that there may not be much snow.

Our big news is that we moved house this year. I say this year as the process took several months – and Denise did two phenomenal jobs in both selling our former home and buying our current home. Our saga started last December (2009) when we saw a large home in foreclosure on the river. A builder had put in loads of work and then gone bankrupt. Denise managed to get her name first on the list for consideration by the selling bank – and it was a long list of other potential purchasers. The bank took 5-months to approve the sales process. In what is still a completely dead market for selling homes, Denise sold our home in an amazing 3-weeks (on 8 June) – and for a price that today would be difficult to achieve as the market still drops. Then came the saga. The more we got to examine the house we were to buy, the more we discovered problems; our home inspector politely described the bankrupt builder as a "handyman". With a week to go to the contract, the bank inadvertently gave us a way out when they found a mistake of \$100 in their calculations, so insisted on re-writing all the offer documents that we then refused to sign. So then we went in to a holding mode. First we stayed in one of our Beach Condos for 3-weeks – the boys loved it, with fishing from the pier and swimming in the sea. Then Denise took the boys to Cape Cod for annual vacation for a month (I went up for about 2-weeks at the end to help bring everyone home). Then we rented a home on a golfing community; not that we golf, but the boys enjoyed fishing in the lakes. Meanwhile another foreclosure came on the market barely 100 yds from our old house but much larger; actually on the same canal but the other side and 2 houses down. Denise again did some amazing realtor wizardry to get her name to the top of the list and managed to negotiate a very good price, especially with the extra power of having already sold our home. So we have moved and <u>adore</u> the house. It is perfect for us. It has 5-bedrooms; we have the master

and master bathroom; Granny has the largest other bedroom and her own bathroom; and the boys get their



own rooms and a bathroom. We have a swimming pool; it is on a canal that the boys love for fishing; there is vacant land next door with a tennis court (it used to belong to this house but the previous owner sold it off to a partner who now doesn't know what to do with it; so we hope one day we might acquire it back). The house is on an L shape with the pool inside the L. The walls of the main rooms overlooking the pool are pocket glass slider doors, so open right up. It is just gorgeous to sit outside and mull over the day over a glass of wine. We have recently added a firepit on the dock, so can burn a few logs in the evening and enjoy the glow of the fire while the boys fish.

We are still both doing "ISO9000 training work" around north America for LRQA. Denise is their top trainer and continues to get rave reviews from all her clients as well as from an independent auditor from IRCA who ways auditing LRQA. I have also continued to travel internationally on my Social Accountability auditing work to Europe, Brazil and India; as well as manage the sheet metal company.
